The Trust is not able to provide the 'reason' for breaching 18 week pathway as this is not something that is recorded on its Patient Administration System.

Please note: The figures for the 21st December 2015 are provided as an un-validated position and are representative of a snapshot in time.

This snapshot of longest waits is not representative of the overall wait for treatment at the Royal Devon and Exeter NHS Foundation Trust. Nationally available figures can be found here https://www.england.nhs.uk/statistics/statistics/statistical-work-areas/rtt-waiting-times/

Under the NHS Constitution for England, patients have a legal right to start treatment within 18 weeks after GP referral for non-urgent conditions. If this is not possible, the NHS must take reasonable steps to offer them a range of alternative providers. This is measured using the Incomplete

operational standard known as Referral to Treatment (RTT) and is reflective of the total waiting list (patients who are still waiting for treatment).

Most patients will choose to be seen at the earliest opportunity. However, patients are entitled to wait longer for their treatment if they wish. Patients are allowed to plan their treatment around their personal circumstances, taking account of clinical advice where undue delay may present a risk to them even if this means they will be treated beyond18 weeks.

Some patients may fall into the clinically complex category and where this is clinically appropriate will wait longer, as diagnosis and treatment plans are formulated and agreed.
